



SERVICE LEARNING AND CIVIC ENGAGEMENT THROUGH HIGHER EDUCATION

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A TIERED SUPPORT FRAMEWORK FOR SERVICE LEARNING: STRENGTHENING FACULTY, STUDENTS, AND COMMUNITY PATHWAYS

ABSTRACT:

This session highlights The University of Texas Rio Grande Valley (UTRGV) practice-based, tiered Service Learning (SL) support framework developed over the past decade. The model strengthens faculty, students, and community partners through coordinated assistance. The framework provides nonprofits with volunteer management tools, equips faculty with professional development and syllabus design support, and engages students through trained SL Ambassadors. Participants will explore lessons learned, practical tools, and replicable structures for sustaining community-engaged teaching.

THEMATIC FOCUS:

Convergence and Intersections: How increasing or decreasing hyperconnectivity can impact community engagement.

Floods and Droughts: Too much of one thing, not enough of another. How complimentary partnership can fill the gaps.

Gauging the Waters: Using research and assessment to course correct or gain deeper insight.
